

Physics Students Launch Successful Moon Rocket

Journalism Instructor Reveals Tales of Woe



I can recall a morning, about a month ago, when I lost a few members of my staff. They didn't quite meet my qualifications. Bless them!



"April fool," my editor yelled as he plunged to the ground.



The Glendale High School library would like to inform students of the wide variety of books just obtained for the use of all students.






